London Concert Choir is looking forward to celebrating its 50th anniversary in 2010. Now with more than 100 members, the choir regularly appears at all the major London concert venues, and has toured to France, Belgium, Holland, Germany and Ireland.

The choir has a broad and varied repertoire – this season the music ranges from Handel to Duke Ellington. Previous seasons have featured a reconstruction of Mozart's C minor Mass (in its London premiere), settings by Gretchaninov and Tchaikovsky of the Russian Orthodox liturgy and cantatas by Britten. The choir has recently performed the Brahms German Requiem with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra and Beethoven's Missa Solemnis with the English Chamber Orchestra.

London Concert Choir has also presented concert versions of Purcell's Dido and Aeneas and Gershwin's Porgy and Bess. It regularly gives performances for charity and over the years has sung a number of specially commissioned works.

Mark Forkgen , who has directed London Concert Choir since 1996, is also Music Director of Canticum chamber choir and Principal Conductor of Kokoro, the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra's contemporary music group. Mark has worked as guest conductor with leading British orchestras and has given the first performances of around 100 works. A champion of Youth Music, he is currently Conductor of Dorset Youth Orchestra and Director of Music at Tonbridge School.

Jonathan Beatty, Assistant Conductor and Principal Accompanist of the choir, is a vocal coach at the Guildhall School and has won numerous prizes as an accompanist. He is a member of Kokoro and works regularly as repetiteur with the BBC Singers, Monteverdi Choir and Philharmonia Chorus.

Duke Ellington, bandleader, pianist and composer of big-band jazz, had a deep religious faith. In his last decade he composed the music for a series of remarkable Sacred Concerts that he and his orchestra gave from 1965 onwards.

MOZART: 'CORONATION' MASS IN C

Mozart's Mass in C is one of the most popular of his sacred works. Dating from 1779, it was probably composed for the Easter Day service in Salzburg Cathedral, but later came to be performed at the coronations of both the Emperor Leopold II and his son Francis II. The Mass setting is extremely varied – ceremonial in style, but concise in form.

The bicentenary of Mendelssohn's birth is marked by a performance of his choral symphony, written in 1840 for the Leipzig festival to celebrate the 400th anniversary of Gutenberg's printing press and its contribution to human enlightenment. An orchestral sinfonia leads to an extended choral finale, praising God and rejoicing in the triumph of light over darkness.

Handel, who died 250 years ago, was a governor and benefactor of Thomas Coram's Foundling Hospital for 'exposed and deserted young children'. For a fundraising concert in 1749. Handel contributed this anthem, which incorporates music from several previous works and ends with the 'Hallelujah Chorus' from Messiah.

The same concert also included his exultant Royal Fireworks Music, composed earlier that year for George II, to celebrate the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle. In 1727 Handel had produced four splendid anthems for the King's coronation: the best-known is 'Zadok the Priest', which has been performed at every British coronation since.
