London Concert Choir has just celebrated its first 50 years and now has around 150 members of a wide range of ages. Notable for its unusually broad repertoire, the choir regularly appears at all the major London concert venues and in churches and cathedrals in and around the capital. The choir also undertakes foreign tours and looks forward to visiting Germany in July 2011.

During its anniversary year the choir gave two memorable performances of Britten's War Requiem: at the Barbican with the Southbank Sinfonia and in Salisbury Cathedral with Dorset Youth Orchestra.

Highlights of recent seasons have included Haydn's Creation at Guildhall and Handel's Coronation Anthems at Cadogan Hall, both with Counterpoint; and Dvorak's Stabat Mater and Vaughan Williams's Sea Symphony at the Southbank Centre with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. At the Barbican the choir has sung Mendelssohn's Lobgesang with the RPO and Beethoven's Missa Solemnis with the English Chamber Orchestra.

London Concert Choir has also performed concert versions of Purcell's Dido and Aeneas and Gershwin's Porgy and Bess, presented Ellington's Sacred Concert and Orff's Carmina Burana, and appeared in the Star Wars concerts with the RPO at the O2 Arena. The choir often gives concerts for charity and has commissioned a number of new works over the years.

Mark Forkgen, the choir's Music Director since 1996, is also Music Director of Canticum chamber choir and Principal Conductor of Kokoro (the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra's contemporary music group). Mark works as guest conductor with leading British orchestras and has given the first performances of around a hundred works. A long-time champion of Youth Music, Mark is Conductor of Dorset Youth Orchestra and Director of Music at Tonbridge School.

Jonathan Beatty, Assistant Conductor and Principal Accompanist of the choir, is a vocal coach at the Guildhall School and has won numerous prizes as an accompanist. He is a member of Kokoro and works regularly as a repetiteur.
